
### **Engaging Voters and Candidates**



Our Homes, Our Votes is NLIHC's voter engagement effort focusing on increasing voter registration and turnout amongst low income housing renters and advocates.



To CNN, The New York Times, and moderators of the next presidential candidate debate:

The undersigned 852 organizations urge you to ask each presidential candidate how they would address the nation's housing and homelessness crisis.

Our country is in the grips of a severe and pervasive housing affordability crisis. Nationally, there is a shortage of 7 million hones affordable and sealable to the lowest-income renters. Rents have risen faster than renters' incomes over the last two decades, and while more people are renting than ever before, the supply of housing has lagged. Fewer than 4 affordable and available rental home exist for every 10 of the lowest-income renter households nationwide. As a result, record-breaking numbers of people cannot afford decent homes. Every state and community—unknown, rural, and suburban — is impacted.

So far, 11 presidential candidates have released major housing plans or other housing proposals to address the housing grists. They are talking about these plans on the campaign trail — in town halls, forums, and meetings in New Hampshire, lowa, and beyond. But during the first two rounds of presidential debates, debate moderators have neglected to directly ask candidates how they would address our nation's housing affordability crists. People in America need to hear all presidential candidates share what they will do to make homes affordable to the tens of millions who are struggling to keep croof sover their heads or who have no homes at all.

This is an issue of paramount importance to voters. According to a recent national public opinion godi, 60% of people say housing affordability is a serious problem where they live, up 21 points from 2016. Over 61% of people report having to make at least one sacrifice in the past three years because they were struggling with housing costs, such as cutting back on learning activities for their child, nutritious food, or healthcare.

Strong majorities of the public expect solutions – 83% say elected officials are not paying enough attention to the cost of housing and the need for more affordable housing. Nearly 8 in 10 people in America say the president should "take major action" to make housing more affordable for low-income families. And 91% of Democratic voters say they are more likely to vote for candidates who have detailed plans for making housing more affordable.

### SOLUTIONS TO THE AFFORDABLE HOUSING CRISIS



JUNE 14, 2019

THE NATIONAL AFFORDABLE HOUSING CRISIS CONTINUES TO WORSEN, making it impossible for the lowest-income seniors, people with disabilities, families with children, and low-wage workers to pay rent and make ends meet. Nationally, there is a shortage of 7 million homes affordable and available to the lowest-income people; for every 10 of the lowest-income people, there are fewer than 4 homes affordable and available to them. Every state and community – whether urban, rural, or suburban – is directly impacted.

THE AMERICAN PEOPLE WANT ACTION. According to a recent national poll, 85% of people in America believe ensuring everyone has a safe, accessible and affordable home should be a top national priority, and 8 in 10 want major action from Congress and the White House. Seventy-six percent are more likely to vote for a candidate with a detailed plan on making housing more affordable. Across the political spectrum, candidates with a detailed plan to make housing more affordable are more likely to garner support at the ballot box from Democrats (91%), independents (70%) and Republicans (63%).

#### POLICY RECOMMENDATIONS TO ALL PRESIDENTIAL CANDIDATES

#### Preserve and build deeply affordable homes.

Ending the affordable housing crisis requires a major investment in developing homes affordable to the lowest-income people. The underlying cause of the affordable housing crisis is the severe lack of affordable rental homes for America's lowest-income households – the only segment of the population for which there is an absolute shortage of affordable and available homes. Because the private sector cannot on its own build or maintain homes at a price these families can afford, the federal government must play a leading role.

The national Housing Trust Fund (HTF) was designed precisely to address this need. It is exclusively targeted to help build, preserve, rehabilitate, and operate housing affordable to people with the lowest incomes. The HTF is administered by HUD as a block grant, giving each state the flexibility to decide how to best use HTF resources to address its most pressing housing needs. The HTF should be expanded significantly to at least \$40 billion annually.

Restrictive local zoning is a significant barrier to addressing the nation's affordable housing needs. The federal government should incentivize or require local governments to eliminate restrictive zoning policies by tying changes to local zoning to federal transportation, infrastructure or housing dollars. ust also do more to preserve our nation's existing affordable housing infrastructure, public housing is home to more than 2.6 million low-income people, Congress has put homes at risk of decay and disrepair through chronic underfunding. Between 2000 106, funding for public housing repairs was cut in half. As a result, many public housing les are unable to make needed repairs to preserve these homes, and our country loses to 15,000 public housing apartments annually. The funding needed to address If repairs in public housing is estimated to exceed \$50 billion.

#### rovide rental assistance.

1960, renters' incomes have increased by 5%, while their housing costs have increased 6. Despite the growing gap between wages and housing costs, only one in four s gets the housing assistance it needs because of chronic underfunding. Candidates d call for a major expansion of Housing Choice Vouchers and/or the creation of a red renters' tax credit to help families keep more of their incomes for other essentials bd, medicine, education, and transportation.

#### revent families from facing evictions and homelessness.

untry needs a National Housing Stabilization Fund, a new national program to help it evictions and, in worst cases, homelassness. The program could provide temporary al assistance to help cover rent for households experiencing unexpected economic is (e.g., loss of work hours, unreimbursed medical bills, a broken-down car). Coupled tability services, such as counselors and legal aid, this program would extend an ency cushion to low-income people in crisis, helping them avert the downward spiral of g instability and homelessness.

#### rotect renters from discrimination and abuse.

20 presidential candidates should support a broad array of renter protections, dates should endorse federal legislation to ban housing discrimination on the basis rec of income, gender identity, and sexual orientation, and pledge to increase ement of existing fair housing laws, including state and local obligations to attvely further fair housing. Candidates should also consider proposals to support a all right to counsel for renters facing eviction.
